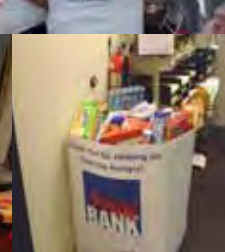

# IMPACT IN ACTION

*Through the strategic combination of the various aspects of our IMPACT initiative - **community leadership, pro bono & volunteerism** - we believe we can make positive, lasting change in our communities. Functioning together, these elements enable us to more fully engage in the community and produce positive, lasting change.*

## AMERICAN RED CROSS

For many years our Firm has been committed to blood donation by hosting blood drives in several offices. The Atlanta office is a member of Lifeboard, which is a group of the Southern Region's companies that have committed to hosting at least five blood drives per year. **Partner Hil Jordan** serves on the Board of the Metropolitan Atlanta Chapter, **Partner Danielle Williams** serves on the Board of the Northwest North Carolina Chapter and **Associate Sabrina Rockoff** serves on the Board of the North Carolina Triangle Chapter. Lawyers in the Atlanta, Raleigh and Winston-Salem offices provide pro bono representation to the American Red Cross in employment and corporate matters.



## APPLESEED

Appleseed is a non-profit network of 16 public interest justice centers dedicated to building a society in which opportunities are genuine, access to the law is universal and equal, and government advances the public interest.



At the invitation of the D.C. Office of the Attorney General, D.C. Appleseed, Kilpatrick Stockton LLP and Crowell & Moring LLP conducted a two-year investigation of the District of Columbia child support system. Their challenge was to examine the roots of the District government's child support crisis which culminated in a written report presented to the District City Council, Mayor, Attorney General and other groups. The report included several recommendations to improve the child support system. **D.C. Office Managing Partner, Steve Baskin**, was recently appointed to serve on D.C. Appleseed's Board of Directors.

Our Atlanta office has served as the base of Georgia Appleseed's operations since its founding in 2005. This year, KS lawyers firm-wide participated in Georgia Appleseed's Heirs Project. "Heirs property" refers to real property passed to heirs without benefit of a will or probate, often resulting in complex property ownership issues. The Project helps disadvantaged rural and urban property owners preserve their property rights. **Partner Steve Clay** just completed his term as founding Board Chair and Georgia Appleseed honored him by naming its annual award the A. Stephens Clay Good Apple Award.

## TOOLBANK USA

The ToolBank supports community efforts in strengthening neighborhoods by gathering and sharing resources. It has been a pro bono client since 2007, and we have assisted them with corporate issues, licensing agreements and other intellectual property work.

### COMMUNITY COUNCIL FOR THE HOMELESS AT FRIENDSHIP PLACE

Friendship Place is the short name for CCHPF, an organization dedicated to enabling the homeless and formerly homeless in the upper Northwest area of the District of Columbia to rebuild their lives with the involvement of the community. In addition to supporting 150 apartments through its Neighbors First Program, Friendship Place also runs Zeke's House, Veronica's House and The Haven. Friendship Place was the beneficiary of the Washington, D.C. office's most recent in-office Sandwich Making project and the office supports the Neighbors First Program by donating supplies (towels, sheets, food and other items) formerly homeless individuals need when they move into D.C.-funded apartment housing. **Counsel**



**Suzanne Walker** serves on the Board of Directors and hosts an annual holiday event called "Socktails." At the annual "Socktails" event, guests are encouraged to donate red socks and/or cash to Friendship Place. The red socks are then distributed to those Friendship Place serves during the holidays to spread a little cheer and the funds go to supporting the organization's programs. The Washington office also provides pro bono employment representation to Friendship Place.

### GRANDPARENT ADOPTION PROGRAM (GAP)

Begun in 1997 with Atlanta Legal Aid, expanded to Charlotte, Raleigh and Winston-Salem in 2003 with Legal Aid of North Carolina, and to Washington, D.C. in 2004 with the Children's Law Center, this program addresses the needs of relatives caring for children whose parents are absent due to incarceration, alcohol or drug dependency, abandonment, AIDS or other illnesses. Since the inception of the program, almost 500 children have been adopted, with others in the works.

In addition to handling the adoptions themselves, **Partners Mike Rafter and Dean Russell** and **retired Partner Rick Horder** serve on the Atlanta Legal Aid Board and **Partner Gregg McDougal** serves on the Legal Aid of North Carolina Board. In Atlanta, the children receive backpacks at their adoption hearing and GAP families are provided holiday gifts.

## RON CLARK ACADEMY

The Firm is now serving as general counsel for this dynamic school in south Atlanta which has gained national attention for its innovative teaching methods. The Firm has provided legal representation on finance matters as well as trademark and copyright work related to the children's music. Founder Ron Clark visited the firm to help kick off the 2008-2009 school year for our Freedom Writers mentoring program, which has incorporated concepts from his book The Essential 55 into the program. The Firm supports families of these children through its annual support of the school's Xtreme Room Makeover Challenge. **Partner Bailey Teague** has recently joined RCA's Board of Directors.



## SUMMIT HOUSE

Summit House, with facilities in Charlotte, Greensboro and Raleigh, is an innovative alternative to incarceration for women who are pregnant or have young children and who have been convicted of non-violent felonies. Instead of the mother going to prison and the children going into foster care or being shuffled between family or friends, she and the children are able to remain together as a family at Summit House while they work towards putting their lives back together. Lawyers in all three North Carolina offices have provided pro bono services, most recently playing an active role in the restructuring of their corporate model. **Attorney Emily Moseley** serves on the Board and others have volunteered at the houses.



## VOX TEEN COMMUNICATIONS

This teen newspaper is metro Atlanta's only uncensored, city-wide forum for expression created by teens for teens. The Firm has advised VOX on intellectual property, employment, employee benefits and corporate issues. **Pro Bono Partner Debbie Segal** is the past Chair of the Board of Directors and our **Associate Director, Social Responsibility, Whitney Munn**, joined the Board in 2009 and chaired Sip & Shop, VOX's fall fundraiser. Over the years **John Page, Associate Director of Public Relations**, has also donated his PR expertise. The Firm also participates in its annual Spelling Bee, in which spellers from companies across the city compete for the Championship title. Our very own **Partner Bill McMillan** was runner-up in the city-wide competition this year! Additionally, several students from our Freedom Writers program write for the paper and one leads all of the Epiphany Girls Group programming for the organization.

Cristin provided almost 275 hours of representation on tax matters to over 35 non-profit organizations and Jennifer and Leslie each spent over 300 hours representing the best interests of a child in a highly contested custody matter, where the father was so litigious and threatening that they seriously feared for the safety of the child.

## **Paralegal of the Year Award - LA ASIA CANTY**

La Asia provided over 165 hours of pro bono work to non-profit organizations and individuals facing bankruptcy.

## **Fish Out of Water Award - RAY BENNETT**

This award recognizes someone who steps out of his comfort zone and makes a significant impact. Ray uncovered juror misconduct during post-sentencing interviews in the death penalty sentencing phase which resulted in the over-turning of a death sentence. The juror, contrary to law and jury instructions, consulted her clergyman and friends about imposing a death sentence. The client will remain in prison for life, but will not be executed.

## **Office of the Year Award - WINSTON-SALEM**

The winner is chosen through a mathematical formula that evaluates hours per lawyer, percentage of hours to billables and percentage of lawyers who exceed 20 and 50 hours of pro bono.

# COOK ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

The Winston-Salem office has supported Cook Elementary School for almost a decade. Our primary focus is on 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students, but we also organize a variety of efforts throughout the year to assist the entire school.

This year the office continued its successful monthly “Stories of Excellence” lunches, launched during the 2007-2008 school year. In addition to “Stories of Excellence,” we also facilitated Speech and Essay Contests, sponsored the annual 4<sup>th</sup> Grade vs. 5<sup>th</sup> Grade Basketball Game, took 22 5<sup>th</sup> graders to tour the campus of the University of North Carolina Chapel-Hill and held an Art Contest for the students to design the office’s 2009 Holiday card. The firm once again provided discretionary funds to assist with school field trips, teacher recognition and teacher training. Through these efforts the firm has been able to significantly impact the students and faculty at Cook.

### **UNC – Chapel Hill Field Trip**

To help expose students to a college campus and the importance of higher education, **22 5<sup>th</sup> grade students** traveled to Chapel Hill and participated in a tour of the UNC campus, visited the Morehead Planetarium to see the “Solar System Adventure” show and met with a Covenant Scholar at Wilson Library. The future Tarheels also ate lunch at the largest off-campus dormitory, visited the UNC School of Law, spent time with a law student and ended the day with a visit to the Carolina Basketball Museum.



### **4<sup>th</sup> Grade Essay Contest**

The students were asked to write essays comparing the different regions of North Carolina and awards were given for Best Overall, Best Researched, Most Descriptive and Most Original. Volunteers visited the school and met with students to assist them in researching and writing their essays as well as helping judge the essays.

# BOOKER T. WASHINGTON FREEDOM WRITERS

Kilpatrick Stockton developed a four-year partnership with The Freedom Writers Foundation, Atlanta Public Schools and Booker T. Washington High School during the 2006-2007 school year to engage a core group of students, English teachers, an academic coach and Kilpatrick Stockton attorneys and staff as mentors and writing coaches. The defining goals of our partnership have been: (i) to apply our skills as lawyers and legal staff to enhance our students' writing skills, (ii) to see all of our students graduated at the end of their senior year prepared to attend college, and (iii) to inspire at least 10% of the students to attend law school and at least one of the students to return to practice law at Kilpatrick Stockton.



In its fourth year, the BTW Freedom Writers mentoring initiative boasts a total of 58 attorneys and staff who mentor 77 students. The mentors work in 3-4 person teams and visit the school weekly to assist their students with a variety of activities designed to improve their reading, writing, communication and life skills.

## Second Semester Junior Year

During the second semester of the 2008-2009 school year the firm organized numerous activities in addition to our weekly mentoring sessions to help our students begin to see the world outside their neighborhoods. For example, we took them to Birmingham, Alabama in April to see first-hand where some of the monumental events of the Civil Rights Movement took place and also toured Miles College. This was the first time many of our students had been outside Atlanta. We also celebrated the end of a successful school year with a Year-End Celebration luncheon at the legendary Paschal's restaurant in Atlanta. Students were able to utilize the etiquette skills they learned in one of our weekly sessions and impressed everyone in attendance!



## First Semester Senior Year

Our primary focus during the first semester of the 2009-2010 school year was helping our seniors submit at least three college applications by the end of December. In order to assist them in achieving that goal, we hosted an essay contest where students "applied" to Freedom Writers University and had to write an essay describing an experience that helped to shape them into who they are today. They worked in peer review groups to select the students who would be "admitted." The students selected as Presidential Scholars received \$25 gift cards in addition to the highly-coveted admission to Freedom Writers University.

In October, we took the students to visit the campuses of Atlanta Metropolitan College, Gordon College and Fort Valley State University. They heard from admissions officers and current students about campus life, scholarships, financial aid, etc. and returned inspired to submit their applications before they left for Winter Break.

# BACKPACK CHALLENGE

Our 7<sup>th</sup> annual **Backpack Challenge** resulted in nearly **1,000 backpacks** stuffed with school supplies being donated to low-income children along the east coast to help them have a positive start to the school year. Since its inception, the firm's Backpack Challenge has donated over **5,200 backpacks** to children throughout our communities. In 2009, each office hosted a stuffing party where volunteers filled the backpacks full of school supplies.

The Atlanta office's **500+ backpacks** were donated to **Hill-Hope Elementary**, the office's Everybody Wins partner school, and the **Georgia Justice Project**, a pro bono client of the Firm. Volunteers also helped distribute the backpacks at GJP's annual Back-to-School Carnival.



The Augusta office supported **United Way's "Stuff the Bus" campaign**, which provided school supplies to children throughout the Central Savannah River Area. In addition to all the supplies that the office donated, they also raised enough money to make a financial contribution to the "Stuff the Bus" campaign.



Once again, the Charlotte office supported **Seigle Avenue Preschool** by providing arts and crafts bags full of school supplies to students. Volunteers brought 15 students to the firm and helped them "shop" for their supplies in the "KS Store" in order to foster an introduction to basic financial literacy concepts. Then volunteers and students decorated the art sacks together.

The Raleigh office continued their support of **Communities In Schools' Mayview Community Learning Center** by donating **70 backpacks**. Raleigh **Partner Ford Robertson** serves on the Board of Communities in Schools.

For the 5th year in a row the Washington, D.C. office donated their **150 backpacks** to children participating in the **American Association for the Advancement of Science's "Kinetic Kids" program**.



The Winston-Salem office provided **225 backpacks**, enough for every student, to **Cook Elementary**. The office garnered nearly 100% participation in the Challenge and raised enough money to donate extra supplies and materials for the students and teachers at the school to use throughout the year.

# EVERYBODY WINS!

Everybody Wins is a national literacy and mentoring non-profit proven to build the skills and love of reading among low-income elementary students. Attorneys and staff in both our Atlanta and Washington, D.C. offices served as mentors in the Power Lunch program and in 2009 our 69 volunteers spent 30 minutes each week reading to 48 students at Hill-Hope Elementary in Atlanta and Garrison Elementary in Washington, D.C..



Kilpatrick Stockton's relationship with Everybody Wins began more than seven years ago in Atlanta and three years ago in Washington, D.C. This partnership is strengthened by the fact that Atlanta **Partner Rich Cicchillo** serves on the Board of Everybody Wins Atlanta. # ATLANTA

## VOLUNTEERISM

While Freedom Writers and Everybody Wins were our two primary education partnerships in the Atlanta office, there were many other projects organized throughout the year that focused on Health & Wellness and Hunger & Homelessness.

One of the most significant partnerships is with the American Red Cross and is enriched by **Partner Hil Jordan's** Board service as well as the fact that the firm is a member of the American Red Cross LifeBoard. LifeBoard companies are a group of the Southern Region's most dedicated corporate supporters who hold between four and six blood drives a year. Since its beginning, LifeBoard companies have collected more than 130,000 pints of blood, potentially saving more than 390,000 lives. The Firm, one of three law firms in LifeBoard's membership, **hosted six Blood Drives and four HERO Weeks** (for platelet donation) last year and has won awards for meeting or exceeding our quarterly and annual donation goals every quarter and year since joining in 2004.

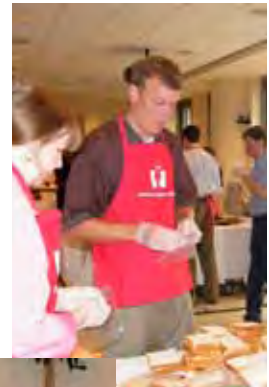


The attorneys and staff in the Atlanta office were especially committed to raising funds to support three health-related organizations in 2009 - the March of Dimes, American Cancer Society and Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. Collectively we **raised over \$12,000** for these organizations and through our participation in the walks **our 76 volunteers took enough steps to walk from Atlanta to our Raleigh, NC office!**

In late 2007, the German government announced a reparations program for Holocaust survivors who were ghetto workers during WWII and released a complex application that needed to be completed as a prerequisite to receive reparation payments. A nationwide project to represent these survivors was established by Bet Tzedek, a Pro Bono Program in Los Angeles, and law firms in major cities were tapped to coordinate the project to bring volunteer lawyers and survivors together.



Kilpatrick Stockton was asked to coordinate the Atlanta effort. **Lauren Estrin, Debbie Segal** and **Debbie Connelly** led the project in partnership with Jewish Family and Career Services. The project involved sending letters to known survivors in Georgia and establishing a hotline for survivors to request applications and information. The Firm hosted the first training session and clinic in our offices. Lawyers from six law firms joined to represent over a dozen survivors, committing their stories to paper and transmitting their applications to Germany for consideration.

### Pro Bono Partnership Legal Checkup

The Pro Bono Partnership (PBP) is an organization that pairs small non-profit organizations with in-house and law firm lawyers on transactional matters. Kilpatrick Stockton was a founding law firm for the PBP and has been the named sponsor of its major fundraiser for the past two years. Partner Debbie Segal serves on its Advisory Board. One of the ways that PBP identifies the specific legal issues facing a non-profit is through their Legal Check-up events. In February, Kilpatrick Stockton lawyers hosted a Legal Check-up with the Pro Bono Partnership and 10 in-house counsel at AT&T. The morning for the 30 lawyers began with training on how to spot legal issues in the areas of Corporate, Tax, Employment and IP, taught by **Adj Awotwi, Cristin Burke, Yendelela Neely** and **Alex Fonoroff**. After the training, 10 teams of two KS lawyers and one AT&T lawyer met for two hours with representatives of 10 non-profit organizations to assess their legal needs. Many of our lawyers followed up with the non-profits and undertook pro bono projects for them.



### International Parental Abduction cases

The Atlanta office continues the Firm's work in representing left-behind, foreign, low-income parents whose children were brought to the United States openly or surreptitiously by the other parent, who refuses to return them to their home. When the children are located in a city where Kilpatrick Stockton has an office, the U.S. State Department contacts us to represent the parent in the foreign country. Lawyers file lawsuits in federal district court seeking the return of the children, arrange and pay for the client



to travel to the United States and stay in a local hotel, oversee the reunion of the client and his or her children and try the case in court. These cases move extremely quickly and require agile balancing of the interests of the client, children, law enforcement, foreign language interpreters, embassies and the courts. This year, through the advocacy of the Firm's lawyers, six kidnapped children were returned to their countries of habitual residence.

# AUGUSTA

## VOLUNTEERISM

The Augusta office partnered with the Lions Lighthouse Foundation, Broad Street Ministries and United Way's Stuff the Bus Campaign (as part of our Annual Backpack Challenge) in 2009 and concentrated our efforts on three collection drives for specific items to help those in need in our community. Despite our small size, we made a tremendous impact!



## PRO BONO

### Court Appointments

As members of the Federal District Court for the Southern District of Georgia, Augusta lawyers are called upon to represent federal prisoners who are appealing their convictions and sentences. The Augusta office donated more than 300 hours representing their appointed clients and also found time to provide representation to a dozen community non-profits on a variety of issues.

## PRO BONO

### Guardian ad Litem

Each year, numerous Kilpatrick Stockton lawyers from Charlotte, Raleigh and Winston-Salem represent the best interests of children in a wide range of pro bono cases. They were victorious in a number of cases before the North Carolina Court of Appeals, where their briefs in support of the termination of the parental rights of parents who abused and neglected their children enabled the children to be eligible for adoption by caring foster parents. Charlotte lawyers represented a juvenile from El Salvador who was forced by gangs to leave the country, obtaining for her Special Immigrant Juvenile Status which allowed her to remain in the U.S. In Charlotte, in partnership with the Council for Children's Rights and in Winston-Salem, in partnership with the Children's Law Center, Kilpatrick Stockton lawyers have spent thousands of hours representing the best interests of over 200 children whose parents were engaged in highly contested custody cases. The Winston-Salem program, which the Firm created with the Forsyth County District Court and Legal Aid and which is now managed by the Children's Law Center, has given a voice to hundreds of children who often are unheard in contentious divorce cases.

## PRO BONO

### Heirs Property

Lawyers in the Raleigh office represent members of the Freeman Family, who have an ownership interest in a 180-acre strip of land, bordered by the Atlantic Ocean on one side and the Intercoastal Waterway on the other. The property has belonged to various members of the Freeman Family since 1855. For years it was used as a family homestead, but eventually came into use as a public beach. During Jim Crow, when most beaches were open to African Americans only after dark, Freeman Beach was the premier beach available to African Americans in the Carolinas.



The issue of "heirs property" arises when written wills are not utilized and land passes from one generation to the next through intestate succession. Often the result is that a single piece of land is eventually owned by so many family members that maintaining the land and making joint decisions becomes difficult. Likewise, as Freeman Beach was passed on from generation to generation, the number of owners increased dramatically, making the determination of who owns what very challenging. The efforts undertaken to clarify our clients' stake in the land were considerable, but the property has immense ancestral value to our clients.

A developer claiming to own a majority share in the Freeman Beach land has petitioned the Court to partition the land owned by various tenants in common, including descendants of the Freeman family. KS lawyers are fighting vigorously to ensure that our clients and others are allowed to retain ownership of land that has been in their family for centuries, rather than having it sold at auction, as has been proposed by the developer.

We also have a significant commitment to organizations serving the homeless and partnered with Bread for the City, Community Council for the Homeless at Friendship Place and Martha's Table to make a tremendous impact in 2009. **Counsel Suzanne Walker** serves on the Board of Community Council for the Homeless at Friendship Place, one of the beneficiaries of our in-office Sandwich Making project. ## PRO BONO

### Native American work

Lawyers in Kilpatrick Stockton's Washington, D.C. office invested hundreds of hours of research and writing to prepare an amicus curiae brief to the U.S. Supreme Court on behalf of the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe of Western South Dakota, whose inherent authority to regulate non-member activities on tribal land was in jeopardy. The brief focused on the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe's jurisdiction to hear the dispute at issue in their own tribal court system and emphasized the adequacy of such a system to reach a fair verdict in the civil dispute between a non-Indian entity and a tribally-owned business. The Firm achieved its goal of educating the Supreme Court about the Tribe's authority and adequacy of its judicial system, as well as advocated against rolling back existing law with respect to tribal civil jurisdiction over non-members doing business with tribes on reservation lands.

### Advocacy for Veterans

Numerous lawyers in the Washington, D.C. office have partnered with Disabled American Veterans to represent veterans in the U.S. Court of Federal Claims seeking awards, or enhanced awards, of disability benefits arising out of combat-related injuries. Prior to the referral of the client to the Firm, the lawyers completed several hours of training sponsored by the Disabled American Veterans organization and attended administrative hearings before the Department of Army's Physical Evaluation Board to familiarize themselves with the relevant administrative practices and procedures. Their work involved research and review of medical records and the filing of lawsuits against the applicable division of the military alleging violations of the National Defense Authorization Act.

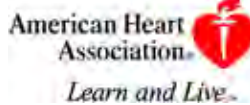
